### **Empathy**

Yesterday, Dhani H. spoke to the students at assembly about sympathy and empathy, and the difference between the two. He did a great job and used easy to understand examples to explain that sympathy was mostly about feeling sorry for others in relation to their current circumstances: whereas empathy was more about understanding another person's circumstances or perspectives, and what it would feel like to be that person.

Empathy is an essential social skill for life. It's the basis of successful relationships at home, within schools and classrooms and in the workplace and is an underlying and core component of a civilized society in which we treat others the way we want to be treated. But how do you teach kids to see someone else's perspective? How do you teach them to walk in someone else's shoes? How many times have you uttered this phrase to kids, "But how would you feel if he did that to you?" An important part of our job is to teach children empathy. Kids can be so caught up in themselves, they don't realize that what they are doing or saying can be hurtful.

Michele Borba, noted parenting expert, points out in her blog about nurturing empathy: "REALITY CHECK: Empathy is the moral virtue that helps children "identify with and feel other people's concerns." When they do, they are more likely to reach out and respond in more caring, compassionate ways to others."

If we want to stop bullying, ostracism, isolation and the carrying out of hurtful acts at schools and online, students must be continually supported to build their capacities to understand and display empathy, and in doing gain a greater compassion for each other. By building a better understanding of empathy in children we can help them realise how their actions impact on others.

### How you can help children build empathy

One way to help children understand, and then anticipate, other people's feelings is to show them faces and body language. The more we interact with people, the more we pick-up on cues: Crossed arms mean someone is angry, upset, or closed off. Someone hanging their head and lingering on the outside of the group is feeling left out. Children often don't have the same degree of experience or understanding that adults do and may miss these body clues.

Another great way to support children as they build their understanding of and capacity to show empathy is by reading picture storybooks with them and talking about the characters' actions, facial expressions and body language. Another option is to watch a TV show and turn off the sound. See how much your child can understand just by watching the faces and body positions.

### A few reminders for students when playing out in the Yard

During Monday's assembly I provided the students with a few timely reminders regarding the behaviour that is expected of all students when out in the yard during recesses and lunch times, for the remainder of this term. These reminders were provided in the interests of keeping all students as safe as possible, whilst playing in the yard, and included:

- Ensuring that they do not engage in playing activities or linger around the bag areas or the toilet areas
- When the bell music sounds towards the end of lunch time and recess, remembering to first take a look around their immediate area for any uniform items (such as bomber jackets or windcheaters) sports equipment or other personal belongings, gather them up and then head immediately to their lining up areas.
- When playing on the oval and engaging in AFL football, rugby or soccer type games, making it clear that they are not to grab or tackle each other in any way, including slide tackles. (see section on soccer play for more information)
  - Making sure that their hats remain on their heads at all times, regardless of what activities they are engaging in We also ask, that as parents and carers, that you please discuss and reinforce the all-important safety aspects related to each of these reminders, with your children.

## **Student Placement Considerations for 2017**

Teachers consider factors such as gender balance, academic abilities, friendship groups and students who work well and do not work well together. This process takes many hours of planning with the purpose being to maximise student learning. Please note this is *not an opportunity to request a particular teacher* as this is an equally complex and separate process. The staff at Camelot Rise have a deep level of professional knowledge, experience and judgement, and will always do the best for each child so as to maximise their learning opportunities. It is also important to note that it may not be possible to grant every request submitted.

### **AFL Roadshow**

Last Friday we had a visit from the AFL Roadshow. It was a great day for all students to rotate through a number of activities including marking, kicking and handballing. There was also a special slide and an obstacle course for the students to tackle. Thank you to Mr Roberts for organising this great event.

### **Soccer Play Outside**

Every now and again challenges arise when large groups of students enjoy playing the same game. Of recent times, we have experienced a number of issues particularly around students accidentally bumping into others and then students retaliating. It is exceptionally important to remind children that this - in no way, shape or form can be accepted or tolerated. Every child has the opportunity at school to choose to play any particular game or participate in any activity they choose, and feel safe. To help children get along and play this game with it's larger numbers safely and responsibly we will be talking with them this week about the following guidelines and expectations:

\*No physical retaliation of any sort (if this occurs it will result in an immediate weekly bad from playing soccer. The child may then join in again if they have had a successful week in the yard during the ban.

- \*No physical tackling/contact
- \*If an accidental bump occurs, the child must acknowledge this so the other child is aware it wasn't intentional
- \*Our teachers on yard duty on level 3 will check in with the students playing soccer on the oval at the beginning of every recess and lunchtime to ensure all is OK, and remain close by as a support

\*Children need to form mixed teams. Issues have been more prevalent when levels play one another – ie. Level 4 against Level 5.

Please discuss this with your child if they play soccer, and let us know if you have any questions. We appreciate your support with this.




